But, consolidation alone didn't guarantee success. The question of *where* to place state victim of crime services was pivotal. Fortunately for us, Attorney General Alan Wilson took up the challenge. Beginning in July 2017, he and his staff have welcomed the new victims of crime division and

ensured we had the tools to be successful. But, the two biggest departments in the new division couldn't afford to pause their operations: the departments managing grants and victim compensation. Thanks to sometimes heroic efforts by the Attorney General's finance, human resources and IT sections, we didn't miss a beat (well, we had some heart attack moments but it all worked out).

**How Are We Doing at DCVC?**

Department of Crime Victim Compensation (DCVC)

The DCVC staff is working hard to improve customer service for crime victims in South Carolina and the professionals who serve them.

Claim Processing Times

We are pleased to report DCVC has reduced the number of days to process a claim by 40% over the previous year! We hope you and the victims you serve have seen a quicker turn around for compensation claims.

When an application is received at DCVC it must be reviewed and documented for completeness. We must determine the following: (1) if a claimant is eligible under the law for compensation; (2) if there is some other source of payment for the loss being requested (DCVC is the payer of

last resort); and (3) if the claim is eligible for reimbursement under our financial guidelines. We perform each of these steps for about 8,000 claims each year.

Surveys – “How are we doing?”

Starting in July of 2018, DCVC started sending out surveys to every DCVC claimant asking a number of questions about their satisfaction with our services. Ultimately we are asking: “How are we doing?” Claimants have the opportunity to: (1) grade our services; (2) provide written feedback, and; (3) let us know if they need additional services. If they tell us they need additional services, DCVC’s Quality Assurance Manager Gail Washington calls them to address any concerns and to provide any addi-

tional assistance, referrals or services they may need. So far the responses have been mostly positive and instructive as we learn better ways to assist our claimants through the compensation process.

Do you have a victim who has been injured and can no longer perform their job? They may be on Medicaid or Social Security Disability, would really prefer to work, but need job training. Or a victim who wants to work but has an injury, or mental health issue and needs to be evaluated to determine if they meet disability criteria. If someone is being evaluated through SC De-

partment of Disabilities and Special Needs, the wait may be as long as a year! **South Carolina Vocational Rehabilitation** may be the answer for them. Victims who have special needs (including mental health, addictions, emotional disabilities, etc.) should be referred to Voc. Rehab. They have offices all across the state. New Grant Solicitation System and Staff

Department of Crime Victim Assistance Grants (DCVAG)

In November, the Department of Crime Victim Assistance Grants (DCVAG) went live with our new *AGO Grants*, a grants management system replacing the 20-plus year old legacy system hosted by the Department of Public Safety. It enables all subreipients to submit Request for Payments, Budget Revisions, and Training Requests directly into the AGO Grants Portal – faster and cheaper than paper submissions! Eligible agencies will also be able to apply for Victims of Crime Act (VOCA), Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) and State Victim Assistance Program (SVAP) grant funds through *AGO Grants* this year.

On March 18, 2019, DCVAG held a workshop to announce the availability of victims of crime grant funds. The workshop provided nonprofit organizations, state agencies and local units of government with information on how to apply for funds, important due dates, and tips for successful grant writing. The application period began March 18, 2019. The deadline for grant proposals is April 30, 2019 at 5:00 PM. A considerable amount of time in the workshop was concentrated on providing detailed instructions on how to apply for these grants, all beginning October 1, 2019. DCVAG has a new program coordinator, Ms. Sheila Hoffman, who comes to the department from the Attorney General's IT division. Sheila is taking the technical lead for the *AGO Grants* system and has become quickly immersed (sometimes drowning) in the development of the software. She will continue to be the liaison with our AGO Grants software vendor and the IT division as the system becomes more robust with additional features added over time.

Tara is the first statistician at the Crime Victim Services Division and she is solely focused on research and analysis of victims' issues.

Tara earned her bachelor's degree in psychology from the College of William & Mary in Williamsburg, VA. Tara holds a master's degree from the Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice at the University of South Carolina and she is

currently completing her Ph.D. in the same department. Her doctoral dissertation investigates arrest trends for cases of intimate partner violence since the early 1990s. Outside of the office, she teaches criminal justice courses at USC and spends her free time visiting family in Virginia and watching sitcoms.

In the weeks and months ahead, Tara will be meeting with stakeholders to become further acclimated with the victim service provider and criminal justice system community. She will be tasked with various projects related to statistical analysis as it pertains to victim services. We are

excited to have the statistical analysis function of our office up and running and we are grateful to have Tara on our team!

VSP 2.0

In January 2019, the Department of Crime Victim Services Training (CVST) initiated the implementation of the revised Victim Service Provider (VSP) training requirements, VSP 2.0. These are the first revisions to the program since its inception in 2009.

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Human Trafficking Information

About Human Trafficking

Human trafficking is often referred to as "modern day slavery," and can be labor trafficking, sex trafficking, or both. Victims vary widely and potentially include citizens, non-citizens, males, females, children, and adults. Trafficking is not something that only happens abroad, and foreign nationals are not the only persons that are trafficked. United States citizens, including South Carolina citizens, are also among those trafficked – and at risk for becoming trafficking victims.

Statistics and data are presently scarce for human trafficking in South Carolina on the state level, due in large part to the underground nature of the crime. With the new South Carolina statute in place, investigators and prosecutors will be better able to bring human trafficking in South Carolina to light, and traffickers to justice. In 2015 the State Grand Jury was given jurisdiction for multi-county human trafficking cases. This allows the expansion of these investigations to follow typical trafficker behaviors, while saving victims from having to re-live trauma because of jurisdictional boundaries.

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ANNUAL REPORT: SC Domestic Violence Advisory Committee

The Governor's Domestic Violence Task Force, composed of representatives from more than 65 state and local government and non-government entities, issued 50 recommendations for establishing best practices and for further study to combat domestic violence in South Carolina.

In 2016, the Domestic Violence Reform Act was passed, which increased penalties for repeat offenders, sought to better protect victims of domestic abuse and created the SC Domestic Violence Advisory Committee.

The Advisory Committee's Annual Report has just been released, and provides details on our state's initiatives toward:

- 1) understanding of the causes and incidences of domestic violence;
- 2) changes within the agencies represented on the committee that will prevent domestic violence; and
- 3) advising the Governor and the General Assembly on statutory, policy, and practice changes which will prevent domestic violence.

DCVC Bill Negotiation Milestone

Did you know that DCVC negotiates bills on behalf of claimants when the bill is over our statutory cap of \$15,000? In fact, many claimants' medical bills far exceed DCVC's maximum award amount.

How Does it Work?

DCVC contacts providers with large outstanding bills about entering into negotiation with DCVC on behalf of the claimant. The provider is asked to sign a written agreement to accept some amount under the \$15,000 cap and also to not balance bill the victims. The agreements with providers are not mandatory and are entered into on a case by case basis for eligible claims.


What are the Results?

Between July 2018 and March 2019, DCVC successfully negotiated 82% of bills submitted to selected providers for negotiation.

On March 4, 2019, DCVC reached a milestone of successfully negotiating 100 large crime related bills on behalf of crime victims. More than \$8,496,351 of crime victim related bills were identified and negotiated with DCVC paying \$665,631 to providers with a written condition that providers not "balance bill" the victims for the difference.

The bill negotiation process is a "win-win" for both victims and providers. This mutually

acceptable outcome adjudicates the outstanding claims for providers and satisfies the outstanding debts for crime victims.



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Public awareness and education is also a large component in anti-human trafficking efforts, and the more that is known about this terrible offense, the quicker it can be stopped.

About the South Carolina Law: South Carolina Code, Sections 16-3-2010 through 2090

In 2012, the South Carolina legislature passed comprehensive new legislation to combat human trafficking in South Carolina. The law became effective on December 15, 2012. South Carolina is now among the states with the highest ranking human trafficking laws in the country. This new statute includes higher penalties than the previous human trafficking statute, criminal liability for business owners engaging in human trafficking, restitution for victims, civil action availability for victims, and asset forfeiture by convicted traffickers. There is also a provision in the statute that the Attorney General chair a task force, along with other essential agencies, dedicated to investigating and addressing the problem of human trafficking.

Community Outreach Services

Law Enforcement and Victim Advocate Outreach Initiative

The purpose of the outreach initiative is to travel the state training and educating law enforcement officers and Law Enforcement Victim Advocates (LEVA's) on the crime victim compensation program, benefits and services as well as providing information regarding how law enforcement officers and LEVA's can work collaboratively with the compensation program to assist crime victims.

The training was approved by the South Carolina Criminal Justice Academy for 1.5 hours of CLEE credit. During the training, officers view two videos endorsed by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and are provided information on the compensation program.

DCVC has completed **11** law enforcement and victim advocate trainings and trained a total of **94** participants in the Second Judicial Circuit.

According to the training summary evaluations, this new outreach initiative has been successful!

During the upcoming Fourth Quarter, the outreach initiative will focus on municipalities and counties in the Third Judicial Circuit.
